- Football, basketball, baseball four-year starter and letterman
- Football 1961 All-County, All-Conference, and Best Lineman Award; 1962 All-County, All-Conference, All-State Team Captain, and MVP
- Basketball 1961 and 1962 All-County, All-Conference, Team Captain, and MVP
- Baseball 1962 and 1963 All-County, All-Conference, Team Captain, and MVP
- 1963-67 received a football scholarship to Duke University
- 1965 and 1966 starting offensive lineman for Duke University
- 1966 and 1967 starting infielder and excellent hitter for Duke University baseball team
- 2025 inducted into the Concord High School Athletic Hall of Fame



Scott Barringer, Mount Pleasant High School 1966-70

- Football and basketball three-year starter 1966-1968
- Baseball four-year starter and All-Conference 1968, 1969 and 1970. Highest Team Batting Average in 1969. 1970 Team MVP. 1967-70 American Legion starting infielder
- Attended Appalachian State University 1970-1974 and received Bachelor of Science. received Master's Degree in Administration at UNCC in 1977.
- 1974 started first JV baseball team and served as the head athletic trainer; 1979-1996 head baseball coach and head athletic trainer at Mount Pleasant High School
- 1982-1996 assistant principal and head athletic trainer at Mount Pleasant Middle School and Mount Pleasant High School.
- 1988 became the first Certified Athletic Trainer in Cabarrus County Schools
- 1996-2011 Cabarrus County Schools administrator, athletic director and director of sports medicine.
- 2011-2024 Atrium Health: Manager/Director of Athletic Training.
- 1978 Mount Pleasant Town Commissioner and Mayor 1992-2001
- Head Athletic Trainer 1996 NC/SC Shrine Bowl, NCATA Hall of Fame 2001 and Mid-Atlantic ATA Hall of Fame 2021



Richard Grey Clarke, A.L. Brown High School 1958-62

- Football 1959-61 fullback and defensive back three years. In 1960, was the WNCHSAA state 3-A football champions and 1961 team captain
- Basketball 1959-62 - three-year player, twice winning

the Conference Championship in 1961 and 1962.

- Baseball 1960 - starting left fielder and pitcher on the Conference Championship and WNCHSAA state 3-A championship team.
- 1961 left fielder and pitcher and All-County
- 1962 starting pitcher with a 10-3 record, Conference Champions, All-County, All-Conference and "Owen C. Hill" Award winner
- 1960 American Legion Post 115 Baseball starting left fielder and pitcher, District and Area 3 champions. Had a 7-1 pitching record.
- 1961 American Legion Post 115 Baseball starting left fielder and pitcher, District and Area 3 champions with a 23-8 record. Had an 11-2 pitching record and won the NC American Legion baseball state championship
- 1962 American Legion Post 115 Baseball starting pitcher and left fielder
- 1967-91 served in the US Army and Army Reserves with the 193rd Infantry Brigade. Served 21 years in the Army Reserves with the 108th unit as a Lieutenant Colonel.
- Worked 33 years in the trucking industry and has been a CCSHOF Committee Member since 2011.



Thomas Jones, Concord High School 1968-71

- Football 1969 All-County, All-Conference and Best Linebacker Award; 1970 All-County, All-Conference, All-State, Team Captain and MVP
- 1971 NC East-West All-Star Game starting linebacker
- 1971 signed a full football scholarship to attend UNC-Chapel Hill but chose to accept the Morehead Scholarship and also play football.
- 1971 UNC-CH freshman team defensive captain and Conference Champions
- 1972-1974 UNC-CH Football Team Linebacker and End; 1972 Won Conference Championship and El Paso Sun Bowl game
- Local business owner for 40 years and coached recreational softball and basketball for 12 years
- 2022 Concord High School Athletic Hall of Fame inductee



Bruce Lambert, Northwest Cabarrus High School 1976-80

- Football 1978 and 1979 All-County, All-Conference, Best Lineman and captain
- Wrestling 1976-80 Weight Classes 185, 195 and heavyweight
- Wrestling 1978-79 All-County, All-Conference, team captain and state qualifier
- Wrestling 1979-80 All-County, All-Conference, team captain. County, Conference and Sectional Individual Champion. State Qualifier at 195 lbs.
- 1979-80 Track and Field shot put and discuss All-County and All-Conference



- 1980-84 Received a wrestling scholarship to Pfeiffer College
- Conference Champion 1981, 1982, 1983 and 1984
- NAIA District Champions three years. NCAA South Regional Champion two years
- NAIA All-American 1983 and '84. Overall record 115-14
- 1991 Pfeiffer Sports Hall of Fame inductee

George Marshall, Northwest Cabarrus High School 1968-72

- Football 1970-71 two-way starter, kicker and letterman. 1971 Conference Champion and state 3-A playoff qualifier
- Baseball 1969 pitcher and 1st baseman. Led team in homeruns; 1970 pitcher who went 6-1 as well as playing 1st base. Received All-County and All-Conference Awards and qualified for the state 3-A playoffs.; 1971 undefeated County and Conference Champions. Received All-County and All-Conference with a pitching record of 8-0.
- 1971 NCHSAA state 3-A baseball champions. He had a pitching record of 4-0 pitching a one-hitter in the first round, a three-hitter in the second round, a five-hitter in the Regional Championship and a three-hitter in the State Championship game winning four games for a 12-0 Record for the Season. He was selected All-State 1st Team pitcher.
- 1972 County and Conference Champions with an overall pitching record of 12-1. Threw his third no-hitter and had nine strikeouts in the state playoffs. Selected All-County, All-Conference and All-State, overall high school pitching career records was 32-8.
- 1969-72 played for American Legion Post 51. Was a standout pitcher, 1st baseman and power hitter.
- 1972 Drafted by New York Mets and played for the minor league Marion Mets of the Appalachian League. He appeared in eight games pitching 25 innings with 21 strikeouts and an ERA of 5.40 with a batting average of .286



- Baseball 1969-71 three-year starter and All-Conference in 1970.
- 1972-76 Received a football scholarship to the University of South Carolina. 1972 played QB on the freshman team. 1973, 1974 and 1975 starter at outside LB/strong safety lettering all 3 years.
- 1976 Graduated from USC with a B.S. in Education. Post graduate work at NC State University.
- 1983-2009 Teacher, football and track coach for Concord City Schools and Cabarrus County Schools.

Bryan Tyson, Cabarrus County Schools 1990-present

- 1981-85 Northwest Cabarrus High School where he played three years of varsity baseball and two years of varsity football.
- 1985-90 Attended and graduated from Appalachian State University where he earned a BS Degree in Health and Physical Education. He began teaching and coaching in Cabarrus County Schools in 1990.
- 1991-2007 Taught P.E. and coached baseball and football at Central Cabarrus; Head baseball coach from 1996-2007 where his teams compiled a record of 215-89-1
- His Central Cabarrus teams won numerous championships: 1996 Conference Tourney Champions; 1997 Conference and District 3-A Champions; 1999 Conference Tourney Champions; 2000 District and Sectional 3-A Champions; 2001 Conference Regular Season and Tourney Champions; 2003 Conference and District 3-A Champions; 2005 Conference Tourney and District 3-A Champions; and 2006 Conference Champions.
- 1998-2000 Head baseball coach for Concord American Legion Post 51 baseball team where his teams won two Regular Season championships with an overall record of 66-34.
- 2008-12 Head baseball coach at Mount Pleasant High School where his teams compiled a record of 101-45
- His Mount Pleasant teams won multiple championships: 2008 Conference Champions; 2009 District and Sectional 3-A Champions; 2010 Conference Champions; and 2011 Conference Tourney Champions; selected to coach the N.C. State Games for five years and coached in the East/West Senior State Game.
- 1997-2012 qualified for the NCHSAA playoffs a Cabarrus County baseball record of 16 consecutive years.
- Selected as Conference baseball Coach of the Year six times (1997, 1999, 2001, 2003, 2006 and 2008).
- Cabarrus County Schools baseball coaching record: 316-134-1 while achieving a 70.22% winning percentage, the highest winning percentage in county history.
- 2002-07 Director of Athletics for Central Cabarrus.
- 2013-present Director of Athletics for Cabarrus County Schools.
- 2022-26 Served on the NCHSAA Board of Directors four years and NCHSAA Executive Committee for two years.
- 2025 Received the prestigious NCHSAA "Charlie Adams" Distinguished Service Award.



Zeb Vance Shue, Central Cabarrus High School 1968-72

- Football 1969-71 starting QB and punter. All-Conference QB; 1970 and 1971 All-County and All-Conference
- Basketball 1969-72 starting guard. Conference Champions 1970 and 1971. Best Defensive Player 1969, 1970 and 1971; 1970, 1971 and 1972 All-County and All-Conference. Team captain and MVP 1971 and 1972
- Track 1969-72. All-County and All-Conference 1970, 1971 and 1972. Conference Champions 1969, 1970 and 1972. Best track runner in the County and Conference 1971 and 1972.
- 1972 set the County record 440-yard sprint of 50.1 seconds that lasted until 1989. Set the County long jump record of 21 feet and 6 inches. Ran the 220-yard dash in 22 seconds for a new County record and ran the mile relay in 3:31, another County record.



Class of 2025 CCSHOF Posthumous Inductees

Luther Corriher, *J. W. Cannon School 1946-50*

- Football 1947 – 1949 outstanding running back, defensive back and captain of the 1949 team.
- Baseball 1947 - 1950 outstanding pitcher leading the team to three straight Conference Championships in 1948, 1949 and 1950. In 1948 they won the WNCHSAA state 3-A championship
- 1949 was All-County, All-Conference and All-State. He had a batting average of .361 and was a defensive standout.
- 1950 went 8-1 as a pitcher making All-County and All-Conference.
- Played American Legion baseball for Post 115 1947 – 1948. The 1947 team won the American Legion Region 4 Championship, Sectional Championship and NC State Championship
- 1948 pitched and played outfield but, due to the Polio epidemic, it forced the season to be cancelled
- 1949 played semi-pro Baseball in the Albemarle League and was a successful pitcher, outfielder and hitter.
- 1950 pitched for Great Falls, SC in the Central Catawba League and had a 14-7 record. He made the All-Star Team as a pitcher.
- 1951 signed a MLB contract with the Pittsburgh Pirates at age 20 and was assigned to the Salisbury Pirates of the NC Class “D”. He finished his first year with 8 wins as a pitcher. In 1952, he played for the Elkin Blanketeers and won 5 games. In two years of professional baseball, he appeared in 62 games, pitched 266 innings, had 32 hits as an outfielder with a .229 Batting Average.



Perry Fields, *Winecoff 1944-47*

- 1944 pitcher for American Legion Baseball Post 115 winning two games during the regular season.
- 1945 team had a 17-5 record during the regular season and qualified for the NC American Legion state playoffs. Perry went 9-2 and led the team to the District and Area Championships.
- 1946 team finished the season 28-6 and qualified again for the NC American Legion state playoffs. Post 115 won the District, Sectional, Regional Championships and the NC State Championship.
- 1946 finished the season with a 12-4 record on the mound. In the regional tournament, he pitched 18 innings, faced 67 batters, gave up 15 hits, six runs and had 11 strikeouts in a 7-6 victory.
- 1947 He signed a MLB contract with the Washington Senators and played for the Concord Weavers in the NC Level “D” League. He appeared in 10 games as a pitcher and an outfielder.



- 1948 joined the US Army where he served overseas in the Korean War for three years. He eventually served a total of 22 years including action during the 1968 Vietnam War and received numerous medals for outstanding service. He retired in 1970 as a 1st Class Sergeant
- After retirement from the US Army, he worked at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Salisbury, NC

Dan Hamrick, *A. L. Brown 1953-59*

- 1937 -1941 he attended Lenoir-Rhyne College where he excelled in football, basketball and baseball. 1941 began teaching, but in 1942 he joined the US Army as a member of the XII Corps of General Patton's Third Army. He was discharged in 1945.
- 1946 played professional baseball for the Rutherford County Owls.
- 1953 came to A. L. Brown High School as a teacher and coach. In 1954, became head men's basketball coach and won the regular Conference Championship, the Conference Tournament Championship and the WNCHSAA State 3-A Championship with a 22-0 record.
- 1954 head baseball coach and won the Conference and WNCHSAA State 3-A Championship with a 15-1 record.
- 1955 baseball team won the Conference Championship and the WNCHSAA State 3-A Championship with a 16-0 record.
- 1956 men's basketball team finished the season with a 12-4 record and the Conference Regular Season Championship.
- 1957 men's basketball team won the Conference Championship, Conference Tournament Championship and WNCHSAA State 3-A Championship with an overall record of 23-2.
- 1958 men's basketball team went undefeated and won the Regular Season Conference Championship with an overall final season record of 20-2.
- 1959 baseball team won the Southern Division Championship. After the season ended, he became principal at J.W. Cannon and served as an administrator until he retired in 1982.



Jerry Moss, *A. L. Brown 1955-58*

- Football – 1955, 1956 and 1957 versatile three-year starter as a fullback, offensive and defensive lineman.
- 1956 won the Conference Championship and made All-County.
- 1957 team captain, All-County, All-Conference, All-State and selected to play in the NC/SC Shrine Bowl Game.
- Basketball – 1956 through 1958. two-year starter as a forward and center.
- 1956 won the Conference Championship and made All-County.

- 1957 team won the Regular Season Conference Championship, the Conference Tournament and the WNCHSAA State 3-A Championship. Selected to the All-County, All-Conference and All-Tournament Teams.
- 1958 won the Conference Regular Season Championship and made All-County, All-Conference and All-Tournament. Leading scorer in the conference during the regular season and conference tournament.
- Baseball – 1956 and 1957. Played 1st base and 3rd base as a starter in 30 games.
- 1958-1962 attended Catawba College, played basketball for three years from 1959-62



Frankie Patterson, J.W. Cannon 1936-40

- 1940-44 Attended the University of North Carolina. He Received his degree in journalism and was a lifetime member of the UNC-CH Alumni Association and Journalism Club.
- 1944 He enlisted into the US Army where he served in the US. Army/ Air Force during World War II in the South Pacific until 1948.
- 1949 Began working at the *Daily Independent* newspaper in Kannapolis. He was a sports writer for area high school and youth league sports.
- In the early 1950's, after several years as a writer, he became the sports editor of the *Daily Independent* for 35 Years before retiring in 1988.
- During his career he covered local "Gray-Y" youth football, basketball and baseball Games, junior high and high school football, basketball and baseball games, Little League, Babe Ruth, American Legion Baseball and minor league baseball games.
- When local student-athletes played in college events, he attended games at UNC-CH, Duke, NC State, Wake Forest, East Carolina, Clemson and South Carolina and wrote about them in the *Daily Independent*.
- He also covered regional college Sports at Davidson College, Catawba College, Barber-Scotia College, Livingstone College, Johnson C. Smith College, Belmont Abbey College, Queens College, Wingate College, Lenoir-Rhyne College, Gardner-Webb College and Greensboro College.
- An avid Sportscar enthusiast he covered Modified, Sportsman, and Winston Cup Series NASCAR races throughout the southeastern United States. He knew all of the drivers and developed a life-long friendship with them.
- He covered professional golf tournaments including the Master's in Augusta, Georgia, the Greater Greensboro Open, the PGA Championship at Tanglewood and the Kemper Open in Charlotte.



- He was a member of the National Motorsports Press Association, the Carolina Golf Writers Association and active in community and civic organizations like the Kannapolis Lions Club, the Kannapolis Jaycees and the Kannapolis Rotary Club.

Gary Sherrill, A.L. Brown High School 1949-53

- Football 1949 starting offensive and defensive tackle for the varsity team as a freshman.
- 1950 started as an offensive and defensive Tackle. On offense, he opened large holes for the running backs and led the defense in tackles for loss and was selected All County.
- 1951 started as an offensive and defensive tackle. Selected All-County, All-Conference and All-Piedmont as a lineman.
- 1952 fourth year, he started as an offensive and defensive tackle. Team was undefeated County and Conference Champions.
- He was selected All-County and All-Conference as a lineman.
- The *Greensboro Daily News* named him First Team All-Piedmont. The *Charlotte Observer* and *Greensboro Daily News* named him All-State.
- Selected to play in the 1952 NC/SC Shrine Bowl Game as a starting defensive tackle.
- 1953-1957 Accepted a full football scholarship to attend Catawba College. He played four years and attained his BS in Education degree in 1958.
- He served in the US Army and remained in the Army Reserves after he was discharged.
- 1957 he began his teaching career in Rowan County. While teaching, he received his master's degree in administration from UNC Charlotte and later became a principal until he retired in 1992.
